Initiatives like The African Union's Continental Education Strategy for Africa

(CESA 16-25) focus on innovation, teacher training, and curriculum development. A new wave of empowerment is sweeping across Africa, driven by a bottom-up approach that recognizes the transformative power of education and finance. Initiatives such as The African Union International Centre for the Education of Girls and Women in Africa (AU/CIEFFA) and the African Union Youth Volunteer Corps Program provide opportunities for girls and women to gain skills and contribute to their communities.

The African Union Women and Youth Economic Empowerment and Financial Inclusion (WYFEI) 2030 initiative aims to unlock USD20 billion to empower women and youth economically, recognizing the nexus between finance, education, and inclusive development. 
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to break down barriers that hinder young women's access to quality education.
